Oakland's annual Chamber of Commerce Legislative Luncheon was held Wednesday, April 3rd at the Oakland Christian Church. Dan Krabel, president of the Oakland Chamber of Commerce emceed the program. After an enjoyable lunch prepared by Lucas Grocery Too and served by the Oakland High School National Honor Society, Dan introduced the new state representative from Coles County, Mr. Brad Holbrook of Charleston and Senator Chapin Rose of Mahomet. They spoke on the recent government legislation discussed in Springfield including agriculture needs, state finances, the continued efforts to find a solution to the pension concerns, gun control,

fracking (a certain type of coal acquisition from Illinois mining operations), financing of businesses, and the concerns about the health care services imposed by the ObamaCare initiatives.

They also tackled questions from the audience concerning the rising costs of health care and the impact of proposed legislation on pension issues dealing with COLA and health care coverage.

The Best for Last

You often hear that the best is saved for last. Now, that's not always true...especially as a kid and you are being picked for a dodge ball or basketball team but it is certainly true in other areas. The best part of the meal is the dessert, right? And that (usually) comes *after* the regular part of the meal. Fairy tales will end in, "happily ever after." Again, the idea that the best thing is the last thing.

Certainly, the Bible is like this. The last book of the Bible, Revelation, tells about a time when there will be a new heaven and a new earth. Revelation 21:14 talks about a time when, "[God] will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away" (NIV). It is *because* of these things that Christians long for heaven.

Volunteer search and rescue people have determined that the folks who have the transmitter can be found in about an hour compared to the traditional search which can take nine hours.

April is National STD Awareness Month 2013

Recently, Douglas County was recognized as the healthiest county in the state. Staying healthy also means to be aware of certain diseases and the behaviors that cause or contribute to those diseases.

The Douglas County Health Department encourages residents to learn about sexually transmitted diseases/infections (STDs/STIs) during the observance of National STD Awareness Month. Public awareness and knowledge are extremely low around the country and STDs/STIs remain at epidemic levels. National STD Awareness Month is a national health observance sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to let people know of the growing crisis of STDs/STIs in America. The American Social Health Association (ASHA) provides estimates on the number of STDs/STIs occurring in the U.S.:

- *One in two Americans will contract an STD/STI at some point in their lifetimes
- *An estimated 65 million Americans are living with a viral STD/STI
- *Each year, there are almost 3 million new cases of Chlamydia

- *One in two sexually active persons will contract an STD/STI by age 25
- *One in four teens contract an STD/STI each year
- *Less than half of adults ages 18 to 44 have ever been tested for an STD/STI other than HIV
- *Over 6 million Americans acquire the virus (HPV) that causes genital warts each year
- *An estimated one in five Americans (50 million) have genital herpes; and, about 1.6 million new infections occur each year

What Are STDs/STIs?

Sexually transmitted diseases (STD), also referred to as sexually transmitted infections (STI), are infections that are passed between [humans](#) by means of [human sexual behavior](#), including [vaginal intercourse](#), [oral sex](#), and [anal sex](#). While in the past, these illnesses have mostly been referred to as STDs or VD, in recent years the term sexually transmitted infections (STIs) has been preferred, as it has a broader range of meaning; a person may be infected, and may potentially infect others, without having a disease.

IEMA Highlights Preparedness for People with Access and Functional Needs in April

Ready Illinois website offers emergency preparedness tips for people with functional needs and their caregivers

SPRINGFIELD – While every home should have a disaster preparedness kit and family communications plan, emergency preparedness is even more critical for households with members who have disabilities, functional needs or may need assistance during an emergency.

Throughout April, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) will highlight the importance of disaster preparedness for people with functional needs as part of its 2013 preparedness campaign.

“An ice storm, tornado or other disaster can leave people without power, heat or water for several days,” said IEMA Director Jonathon Monken. “For those who may need some type of assistance, these conditions can be even more dangerous if they aren’t prepared.”

Monken said the Ready Illinois website offers a guidebook with preparedness tips for people with visual, cognitive or mobility impairments; people who are deaf or hard of hearing; those who utilize

service animals or life support systems; and senior citizens. The guide, *Emergency Preparedness Tips for Those with Functional Needs*, is available at www.Ready.Illinois.gov.

For each functional need, the guidebook provides a list of supplemental items for a disaster kit, tips on developing an emergency plan, suggestions on how to be better informed about community emergency planning and a checklist of preparedness activities.

In addition, the booklet contains a list of items for a standard disaster kit, a cut-out health information card, contact information for agencies providing services to people with functional needs and a copy of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and American Red Cross guide, *Preparing for Disaster for People with Disabilities and Other Special Needs*.

Some STIs can also be transmitted through the use of [IV drug needles](#) after its use by an infected person, as well as through [childbirth](#) or [breastfeeding](#). Some STIs are chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, chancroid, herpes, HIV, and hepatitis B.

Complications From STIs

Undiagnosed and untreated STIs can lead to lifelong health problems, even death. STIs are linked to or can cause:

- *Damage to joints, heart, reproductive organs, and the brain
- *Genital (penile in males or cervical in women) or anal cancers in both men and women
- *Increased risk of tubal pregnancies which can be fatal
- *Infertility (unable to reproduce) in both men and women
- *Liver problems and cancer
- *Blindness, deafness, birth defects, early delivery or stillborns in infants during pregnancy or childbirth
- *Increased risk of giving or getting HIV by 3 times compared to someone without an STI

Many STIs have no symptoms or they are too minor to see. Many people are relying on symptoms to appear before they get concerned. The STIs can persist unless detected or treated, even though the symptoms may go away. The only way to know if an STI is present is to get tested. There is no lifelong immunity once a person has had an STI or gets treated. A person can get infected again and again through unprotected sex.

However- STIs are preventable and most are curable or can be controlled to prevent complications.

Here are some key points:

- *The most reliable way to avoid an STI is to abstain from sex or to be in a long-term, mutually monogamous relationship with an uninfected partner.
- *Latex condoms, when used consistently and correctly, are highly effective in preventing transmission of HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. In addition, correct and consistent condom use of male latex condoms can reduce the risk of other STDs/STIs. Female condoms are also available.
- *There are vaccines available to prevent hepatitis A and hepatitis B infections. There is no vaccine to prevent hepatitis C.
- *There are two new vaccines for ages 9-26 (female and male) that protect against infection by certain strains of some of that main viruses associated with cervical cancer.
- *Some STD/STI screening tests (gonorrhea and chlamydia) are simple and only require a urine specimen.

So if you have read this article, you are now aware of some of the sexually transmitted infections and the problems associated with them. You also have been given some tips on how to prevent those diseases. Please practice safe sex and help keep Douglas County healthy.

Newcomer Providing Offensive Firepower as Panthers Heat Up

Luke Armstrong may be a newcomer to Shiloh High School and the East Central Panthers baseball team, but he is not a stranger to the game of baseball itself. This school year, Armstrong came over from Union Pines High School in North Carolina where in his sophomore year in junior varsity went .354 with nine extra base hits and 12 RBI and looked to bring that over to his new team. Last week, he did just that. The Blue, White, and Silver under Head Coach Mike Taylor took the field hoping to continue the momentum built from two weeks ago as the weather finally warmed up and gave the players some much needed time to play. After the week was finished, the offense heated up along with the weather as the Panthers went 4-1 and finally getting a rhythm going into the rest of April.

The week started off in Arthur with an LOVC showdown against the Arthur-Lovington/Atwood-Hammond Knights and the Panthers had to rally late in this contest after being down 7-2 with a big 8 run sixth inning and then added some insurance with 3 runs in the top of the seventh inning for a comeback 12-7 win. Dalton James went 2 for 2 with both hits being doubles and tallied an RBI while Cyrus Furgeson finished 2 for 4 with 2 RBI and Chance Lemmon also went 2 for 4 with an RBI in the win. Avery Schrock finished 3 for 4 with 2 RBI leading the Knights.

It was then on to Hoopeston on Thursday for a game against the Hoopeston Area Cornjerkers and the Panthers were in a battle all day long, but the offense stayed hot holding on once again for a 10-8 win and extending their win streak to three games. Luke Armstrong had a solid day going 2 for 4



and hitting his first homerun as a Panther while Cyrus Furgeson also chipped in two hits on the afternoon. Connor Cline was the star for the hosts garnering all 8 RBI with four of those coming on a grand slam as part of a 3 for 3 day in the loss.

There was no rest for the Panthers as they headed to Kansas the next day to face off with the defending LOVC champion Tri-County Titans. Cyrus Furgeson on this day let his pitching do the talking holding the Titan offense at bay tossing a complete game only giving up three hits and the offense continued its hot hand capturing a key 6-1 win early on this season. Luke Armstrong got back where he left off with three more hits and an RBI while Dalton Tweedy came up with a clutch pitch-hit RBI late in the contest.

The next day saw the Panther faithful make a trip down south to Benton for the annual RBI tournament hosted by the Benton Rangers. The Panther offense stayed consistent producing runs against two of the tougher teams in Southern Illinois earning a split of the two games played earning a hard-fought 10-7 win against the Farina (South Central) Cougars while dropping a 12-5 decision against the host Benton Rangers. Luke Armstrong stayed on a hot streak going a combined 5 for 7 on the day while chipping in 5 RBI.

The Panthers (7-6 overall, 3-0 LOVC) will have played on Monday in an LOVC contest against the Arcola Purple Riders in Arcola. The team will be back in action this afternoon at Don Stampini Field at Heritage High School in Broadlands for a non-conference contest against the Georgetown-Ridge Farm/Chrisman Buffaloes. These two teams faced off in Georgetown on March 19 with the Buffs earning an 8-6 win and the Panthers look to even the score on home soil. First Pitch is scheduled for 4:30 pm. The team will then travel to Bethany on Friday for another league contest against the Okaw Valley Timberwolves with first pitch to be at 4:30 pm. Weather permitting for all of these games, Diamond Roundup will have the highlights for you next week as the season heads into the midway point of the year.

Brocton Red Barn Market Draws Record Crowd

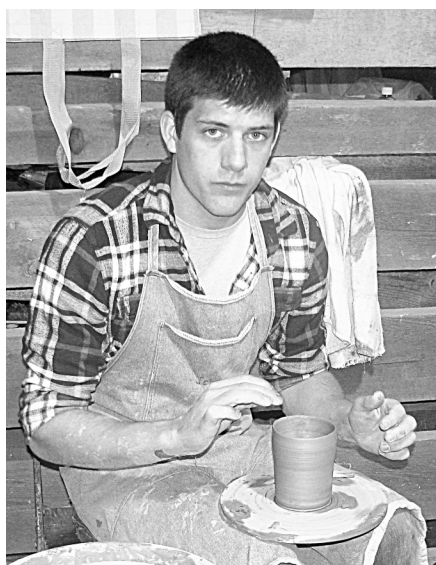

The Recipe Corner

Apple Snickerdoodle Cobbler

Cookie ingredients:

½ tsp cream of tartar
½ tsp salt
½ tsp baking powder
2/3C flour
1/4C unsalted butter, softened
1/3C sugar, plus 1/2C
1 egg
¾ tsp cinnamon

Apple ingredients:

8C apples (roughly 6-8 apples depending on their size)
1/4C brown sugar
½ tsp cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a small bowl, combine first four dry ingredients for the cookie dough.

In a separate bowl or stand mixer, cream butter and 1/3 cup sugar. Add egg followed by premixed dry ingredients. Mix until dry ingredients are blended into the dough well. Set aside.

In a small bowl combine ¾ tsp and ½ C sugar. Set aside.

In a large bowl add 1/4C brown sugar and 1/2tsp cinnamon. Peel, core and slice apples. Add to brown sugar and cinnamon mixture, tossing to coat. Transfer apples to an 8.8 baking dish. Form 1 inch balls of dough and roll in cinnamon sugar mixture. Place coated dough balls on top of apples, press down lightly to slight flatten.

Bake for 45-55 minutes or until apples are tender and cookie topping is lightly golden.

Allow to cool slightly prior to serving. Serve with optional whipped cream or ice cream. May be stored chilled for several days.

A former Douglas County Ag Center Scholarship winner, Stenger was graduated from Arcola High School. From there he moved on to study agriculture at LakeLand College in Mattoon. He applied for the Ag Center scholarship in his second semester. “Since I’m one of four children in my family, I knew it was important to apply for scholarships to help reduce my college expenses,” said Stenger.
