Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, MD of the Canadian Army wrote these words following the death of a young friend and former student, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer of Ottowa. The younger man was killed by a shell burst on May 2, 1915 and buried later that day. McCrae performed the funeral ceremony in the chaplain's absence at a little cemetery outside McCrae's dressing station.

The battle in the Ypres salient lasted seventeen days, an ordeal that McCrae hardly thought possible. He later wrote, "I wish I could embody on paper some of the varied sensations of that seventeen days... Seventeen days of Hades!"



In Flanders Fields

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

McCrae was a surgeon attached to the 1st Field Artillery Brigade and spent more than two weeks treating injured men in the Ypres salient.

This short work, one of the most famous war poems, was written during twenty minutes of precious rest time as McCrae sat on the back of an ambulance, occasionally gazing at the graves nearby among which wild poppies grew. The Lieutenant Colonel was dissatisfied with his work and tossed the poem away but a fellow officer retrieved it and sent it to newspapers in England. Punch published it on December 8, 1915.



Local DAR Chapter Meets at Patterson Springs

The Stephen A. Douglas Chapter, NSDAR celebrated Preservation Month (May) by visiting The Patterson Springs Bed and Breakfast, owned by Marylee and Kim McGee. A power point presentation showed the Patterson House in 1880 when it was built, the Chautauqua era during the first fifteen years of 1900, the pool and the springs and finally the revitalization and renovation by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Nussel in the 1950's to the present.

Historic Preservation was the very first objective of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution when it began in 1890. The bylaws states that it is our mission to acquire and protect historical spots, erect monuments, encourage preservation of documents and relics and to preserve the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots. 

Preventing Dog Bites -What to Tell the Kids

Children under the age of 6 are the highest number of dog bite victims reported in the United States. Many of these bites can be avoided if children and parents are taught how to approach and behave themselves around dogs. Here are a few facts about dog bites that may surprise you:

The majority of dog bites are from your own dog or a friend or neighbors dog.

Most dog bites happen around the dog's food, toys, or bed when the dog is not looking at, barking or moving around these items. In other words the dog is eating or playing and the human reaches in and touches or takes the item away.

Many bites happen when the dog is sleeping and a person pets or hugs the sleeping dog startling it awake. Reaching to a dog that is hiding, crouched or cowering that is avoiding being grabbed by the collar or body could result in a bite. Almost all dog bites to children happen where there is not an adult in the room or area with the child. Stray dogs do cause injury but at a far less rate (less than 25% of all bites) than known dogs. Dogs on leash or behind a fence account for the lowest amount of bites - 5% or

So, what does all this mean? It means we humans do not understand when the dog is telling us that they are stressed, threatened, or unsure of what to do. When we do not listen to the warning of cowering, growling, snarling, snapping the dog is left to use the highest form of aggressing - a bite to make us understand STAY AWAY!!!!! We think it came out of the blue but there was warning. We just did not understand it. And we think what we were doing was not a problem but the dog does. What matters is what the dog understands. If the dog feels it is a threat or is stressed the dog is going to act aggressively.

What we miss is that there may be other factors going on at that moment making the situation difficult for the dog - is there a lot of noise, people, other dogs, is this dog in pain from arthritis, sick, or did you just harshly scold the dog and now you want to give a big hug? All of that makes a dog scared and scared dogs need to have some time to evaluate if things are good or bad. If they don't get that time, they will use their tools - growling, snarling, or snapping to say STOP.

Recognizing signs of fear before the dog start to aggress is important to prevent bites. When you see a dog's tail go down, cower, ears back, start barking in a bossy tone, or growl stop whatever you are doing. Take note what is going on. Are you reaching for the dog, are you pulling on a collar, are you staring at your dog? I cannot cover all the solutions but the best thing is to first avoid these triggers or circumstances. If you have to

get your dog to move, teach the dog come. If you are having a bunch of people over, put the dog in another area. Use a drag line on the collar to move your dog

Now a comment about those stray dogs. At a recent school presentation about 90% of the kids had seen dogs roaming off leash and all of those kids were scared of those dogs. Even when it was a dog they knew the kids were leery as they should be. A dog acts very differently off leash than on. So, if you just let your dog out the door please stops. It is very frightening to the children as well as other walkers and people in your area.

What to do when you see a dog off leash? Be a tree - stop - stand straight with your arms at your sides and look down at your feet (your roots). Wait until the dog is at least 40 feet away before you move. Then call the police or animal control and report the loose dog. We have leash laws that protect our pets from getting hit by a car and protect us from being chased or lunged at by a dog.

Saturday May 18th from 2-4 pm, the Okaw Veterinary Clinic held a pet child safety event. Demonstrations for the proper ways to greet dogs and cats were introduced. If you were unable to make the event, go to www.okawvetclinic.com under behavior help and there are handouts on proper pet greetings and bite prevention help there.

West Nile Virus **Testing Begins**

The Douglas County Health Department has received notice that the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) started accepting submission of dead birds for West Nile virus testing May 20th, 2013.

Surveillance for West Nile virus in Illinois includes laboratory tests on mosquito batches, dead crows, blue jays, robins and other perching birds, as well as testing sick horses and humans with

West Nile-like disease symptoms. It is very important that birds are tested, as when the virus is found among birds, it is indicative that the virus is present in the county. However, it is always a good precaution to protect oneself from mosquito bites.

If a bird is observed while dying or is known to have died recently (within a 24 hour period), please contact the Douglas County Health Department at 217-253-4137 to receive further instruction. Arrangements will be made to collect and send viable birds to the state lab for

May is National Arthritis Month

You have probably heard people say, "Arthur is visiting me today." You may have even said it yourself. But Arthur isn't always the friend from the next town over. Arthur is usually the unwelcome disease arthritis.

May is National Arthritis Awareness Month and the goal is to make folks more aware of arthritis. Better understanding can benefit both patients with arthritis and people who are not afflicted with the disease. In the United States alone there are 46 million adults and 300,000 children with arthritis and other rheumatic

Arthritis is an umbrella term used to describe over 100 medical conditions and diseases, known as rheumatic diseases. The doctors that specialize in the treatment of these diseases are known as rheumatologists. Types of arthritis include osteoarthritis (the most common), rheumatoid, juvenile, fibromyalgia, psoriatic, gout, and others. Each kind has its own set of symptoms and problems. Severe forms of arthritis can be disabling and can affect many aspects of daily living. Arthritis is sometimes difficult to cope with, but there are treatment options available that can help. Medications and physical therapy are just two.

Most of us know that arthritis is painful. But the disease is often misunderstood of misconceptions, because misinformation, and old wives' tales. Unless you or a family member has arthritis, you probably don't know a lot about the difficulties and limitations the disease presents.

Some of the more common myths are:

Myth - Arthritis is an old person's disease. Fact: people of any age can have arthritis, even children.

Myth - Arthritis is caused by a cold, wet climate. Fact: Climate itself is neither the cause, nor the cure.

A theory that arthritis is caused by a cold, wet climate has been around for a long time. Moving to a warm, dry climate has been thought by some as the cure. If that was true then no one in warm regions would have arthritis. Bone rubbing on bone after cartilage has worn away (an arthritic condition) causes pain in any climate. But it is true that warmth can be soothing, people with arthritis often feel better in warm climates, and hot showers or baths can relieve some arthritic

Myth - Arthritis can be cured. Fact: There has been no scientific evidence that a cure for arthritis exists. The idea that arthritis can be cured is not true. So far, there is no known cure for the disease. Although better treatment options are available that can slow down the disease process, nothing has yet been found to stop it. Since arthritis is a lifelong process, the importance of gaining knowledge and understanding of your own health condition cannot be overstated. There is much to be learned about arthritis and the issues it presents.

Myth - Arthritis is caused by a poor diet. Fact: There is no scientific evidence that specific foods prevent or cause arthritis. However, gout, a form of arthritis, can be linked to a diet high in uric acid.

Myth - Arthritis consists of only minor aches and pains. Fact: Arthritis is much more than just minor aches and pains. Commercials, which claim that a couple of aspirin or another over-the-counter pain reliever takes away the minor aches and pains of arthritis, tend to mislead the



Hitting Power and Defensive Gems Lead Panthers into Round of 32

Going into this 2013 post-season, it was already known that this would be the final year of the East Central Panthers baseball co-op program. This program under Head Coach Mike Taylor has been one of the top programs in the LOVC and in the area with a couple of LOVC titles under their belt along with a regional championship in 2010 and were just two outs away from advancing to the Elite Eight that same year. This season started off with heavy hearts as they were without Brandon Umbarger who was killed in an automobile accident on Memorial Day weekend last year and this season was dedicated to his memory. The Panthers used that fuel to propel them to the topseed of their own regional that they hosted last week and looked to make one final run in the storied career of the program. The Blue, White, and Silver used a combination of offensive firepower and great defensive plays to start that journey on the right foot capturing their

second regional title in four years and advancing to the round of 32 this week with a familiar foe waiting for them on the road to Peoria.

Before the post-season started, the Panthers managed to squeeze in one final regular season game traveling to Neoga to face the Neoga Indians on Monday. The host Indians wasted no time pouncing on Panthers starter Royal Charles

to the tune of fourteen runs in the first three innings and the Panther bats were held in check as Neoga cruised to a 14-2 win by five-inning mercy rule. Dalton James garnering two of the Panthers five total hits on the day and Royal Charles took the loss on the mound. The Indians got a huge day from Kenton Albin with two doubles and 6 RBI while Tyler Romack was strong on the hill going three innings only giving up three hits and one walk while striking out four.

It was then on to the post-season on Wednesday in Broadlands as hosts of Hume regional as the top-seed as they faced the Arcola Purple Riders who advanced with a 6-5 win over the Villa Grove Blue Devils on Monday. The Panthers saw themselves having to play catch-up being down 6-1 heading into the bottom of the fourth inning, but the offense finally came to life as East Central scoring thirteen runs combined in the fourth, fifth, and sixth innings with the knockout blow coming with seven runs in the bottom of the sixth inning to pull away and complete a comeback 14-7 win. Cyrus Furgeson led the attack with two hits and 3 RBI and also got the win in relief tossing two innings and giving up only one run. The quartet of Luke Armstrong, Chance Lemmon, Cole Bogle, and Ryan Fitzgerald chipped in 2 RBI each in the win. Seth Still took the loss in relief for the Riders going one inning and giving It was then on to the title game on

Saturday afternoon and a rubber match with the Tri-County Titans. The teams split their two regular season LOVC games and this would decide who would take the season series with a spot in the round of 32 on the line. After pitching a great relief performance on Wednesday, Cyrus Furgeson took the hill for the start and he was masterful the entire day keeping the Titan hitter guessing while getting some great defense behind him. One of the key plays in the game was the trio of Cole Graham, Luke Armstrong, and John Taylor turning a beautiful 4-6-3 double play after the Titans garnered their only hit of the day in the top of the second inning as part of a five pitch inning for Furgeson and he took control from there tossing a one-hit shutout on only 59 pitches as the Panthers cruised to a 6-0 win and taking the regional title. Chance Lemmon went 2 for 3 with a double and 2 RBI while Cole Graham went 1 for 3 with a

with two doubles and three runs scored



In the top of eighth, Jessica Hunt came up with the biggest hit of her career with a two-out triple breaking the tie with two runs to take a 6-4 lead. In the bottom of the frame, Stephanie Hunt stepped on the mound and pitched the biggest inning of her career keeping the Blue Devils off the bases and securing the 6-4 win and giving Shiloh its biggest win in the program's history and

advancing to the title game. Stephanie

Hunt went the full eight innings striking out eight batters and added two big hits in the win. Lizzy Smith also went the distance and had a big day at the plate going 3 for 4 hitting while striking out 17

Raider hitters in the loss. It was then on to Saturday morning and a title game meeting with the number two seed Arcola Purple Riders who advanced with a 4-3 over the host Heritage Hawks on Wednesday. The game itself turned out to be a back and forth affair with 27 total runs scored between the two teams, but the key factor in this contest was the Raiders making key errors in the field in the fourth and fifth innings while protecting a 7-5 lead and the Purple Riders kept the Raider bats in check down the stretch to advance to the round of 32 with a 16-11 win. The Raiders ended up with 8 errors on the day in the field to just the Riders two and it ended up being the determining factor in the contest. Desiree Brown and Lauren Moses were the offensive stars combining for six of the Raiders eleven hits both going 3 for 4 with Brown getting two doubles and 3 RBI and Moses getting a double and 2 RBI. Stephanie Deem went 2 for 4 with three runs scored while Jessica Hunt went 2 for 4 with two doubles and two runs scored. Tori Stierwalt went 1 for 3 with a double and a run scored in the loss. The trio of Kayli Seaman, Laynee Clark, and Sydney Spellman combined for nine of the Riders fourteen hits going 3 for 4 each with Seaman getting 4 RBI, and both Clark and Spellman garnering 3 RBI each. Stephanie Hunt went the full distance for the Raiders tossing four strikeouts and no walks. Kayla Kepley went four plus innings for the Riders tossing five strikeouts and two walks and Laynee Clark earned the save going three innings tossing four strikeouts and four walks in the win.

The Raiders finish an unlikely run at 5-15 overall and 2-9 in the LOVC proving that anything can happen in the postseason and showing that they have a lot of young talent that has grown into the program the past couple of years and look to continue the upward trend that has been happening the past four years. With a lot of experience under their belt, the Blue and Gold showed the heart, pride, and desire to give everything they have on the diamond and now have the mindset that nothing less than 100% effort and play will be acceptable going forward. 
