 Council Holds Special Meetingby Dema Hales
Saturday morning, at 8:00am, March $15^{\text {th }}$, the City Council (except Bill Benner who was unable to attend) opened a special meeting to reconsider the bids for the demolition of the Guha Building (the old Dime Store) located at the intersection in downtown Newman. Originally the council had accepted the bid from R \& R Contractors to remove the building and backfill the area to the level of the sidewalks. After some reevaluation during the week and other considerations, some council members felt a reconsideration of the other bids was worth the time for a special meeting.
The permitting from the EPA was discussed and it was determined by the council that they wanted the firm that did the work to handle any and all permitting required and any filing with the state for compliance of disposal of materials in the demolition. According to Councilman Chris Gordon, the EPA requirement acquired earlier would have to be updated to the time of demolition which needed to include statements that nothing had been changed or has been moved from the site. Also, the demolition company would have to maintain and deliver to the city the receipts of materials accepted at a proper landfill for the debris hauled out. After further discussion, the council decided to void the contract issued to $R$ \& R and accept the contract proposed by B \& J Trucking of Danville. Their bid includes grinding up all brick and concrete residue from the Guha building along with the collected concrete discard at the Newman dump. All that ground material can be used for backfill at the site and road pack around the city where rock materials may be used. They will acquire all permits involved with the demolition of the building. Total cost for the demolition, grinding and hauling to the landfill was $\$ 56,000$. Kevin Tracy made the motion to accept the bid for B \& J Trucking and the motion was seconded by Chris Gordon. The motion passed 5-0 to accept.
With no other items for discussion, a motion was made for adjournment at 8:25am.

President Bailey introduced the guest speaker, August Schetter. of the Southwesterm FFA chapter, Brighton, IL. He is a state FFA officer who recently

returned from a trip to South Africa with the other state officers. He spoke of the agriculture programs over there emphasizing the similarities and differences to those in Illinois. One thing he pointed out was the tremendous size of some of the farm operations that exist
in South Africa. Many farms are 10,000 to 12,000 acres in size. From his slide presentation, the equipment is very similar to the ones in the state. His examples included mostly John Deere equipment. Irrigation is used far more than it is used in this part of Illinois and they rely on sea harbors for transfers of products unlike we do in central Illinois. His talk was well received by the members of the FFA and the audience. He answered many questions after the program was over.
Following the speaker, the CDE Team recognitions were handed out, the Proficiency Awards were issued, and the Foundation Sponsors and FFA Supporters were recognized. Top salespersons were recognized in each class and the Honorary Chapter Degree Recognition awards were also presented.
Ms. Eich, chapter advisor made a few comments on the past year's group and presented a slide show that highlighted

I am the Resurrection and the Life; those who believe in me, even though they die, yet shall they live, and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die.

## John 11:25

E.B. White writes about watching his wife, Katharine, plant bulbs in her garden in the last autumn of her life. "There was something comical yet touching in her bedraggled appearance...the small hunched over figure, her studied absorption in the notion that there would be yet another spring, oblivious to the ending of her own days, which she knew perfectly well was near at hand, sitting there with her detailed chart under those dark skies in dying October, calmly plotting the resurrection."
I love that phrase, "plotting the resurrection." It is filled with hope. In that image we are given both the signs of death and the signs of new life, the seeds of hope under the dark skies of uncertainty. It has been running through my mind so often these days, having watched one of Steve's uncles surrender to the battle with cancer and now imagining what he may be doing in heaven, listening to so many needs, so many prayer requests, so many things beyond our control, "plotting the resurrection." These weeks at our church, we've been talking about the shadows of life - the shadow of temptation, the shadow of ignorance and all that we simply do not know or understand, the shadow of loneliness, the shadow of authority. The shadows seem to overtake us at times, always leading us to despair. How can we plot the resurrection? Where will new hope, new life, appear next? No matter what may happen, our faith is strong in the resurrection.

We also go through hundreds of small deaths in our lives, the first day of school for our children, the signs of aging in our lives, the good-byes to family and friends as they set out on new paths, the letting go of

We stake our lives on the promise of Jesus who says, "I am the Resurrection and the Life." As often as I have said those words, they hold me and give me strength to keep moving forward; they never lose their power or hope.

I wonder where you are plotting the resurrection this season. Where are you feeling out of control, immersed in grief, letting go, noticing the changes of life occurring in spite of your best efforts, and still, and still you carry your silent sentinel of hope deep inside? You know the story and the promise. You have lived it before and it still holds true. "I am the Resurrection and the Life." We are not given over to despair.

As we continue walking to the cross these weeks, we are aware of the autumns, of the darkness encroaching on our lives. We feel the tugs of life's demands and challenges and answers on our hearts. We notice how little control we do have over so many things, the fears that continue to weigh on our hearts. But right in that place, there is a small glimmer of hope, a little piece of dirt, and there I will plot the resurrection and stake my claim in Jesus who will overcome.

Storm Season Is Nearly
Here - How to Help Scared Pets During Storms
Many dogs in the Midwest are afraid of thunderstorms. Maybe a dog was left alone during a bad storm and did not know where to go or what to do. It may be genetic, or it may be something that has been increasing over the years. Whatever the cause, thunderstorm phobia is very common and can range from mild to severe. There is help for your dog. Help is in the form of a plan to teach them to be calm with the help of antianxiety medication as determined by your veterinarian.
Before the storm starts, your dog or cat is already sensing it. Changes in air pressure, wind speed, smell, humidity, and temperature stimulate fear in the dog. They associate these changes with the impending storm. It is really difficult to mimic these events to train the dog to be calm during them. A dog may learn to be less anxious to the sound of thunder by using a recording, but all the other things cause as much fear as the noise. So the dog may be a little less fearful, but not much by training alone.
If your dog is showing any of these signs they are in a high state of panic: pacing, panting, drooling, circling, howling, pawing at their owners,
climbing on to furniture, hiding under
the bed, digging at doors or windows to name a few. These dogs are trying to escape the storm but do not have anywhere to go and cannot self calm. These dogs need anti anxiety medication coupled with a customized plan to teach your dog to go to a safe area and calm down.
Proper anti anxiety medication (not just tranquilizers) on storm days or through the season are very effective. Fluoxetine, Clomipramine, Propranolol are some of the more commonly used medications. These medications help reduce anxiety without making your pet sedate. There are also supplements such as Zylkene the milk calming supplement which can also reduce fear. A check up is needed before starting treatment. Many dogs that have been on medications through a storm season needed significantly less meds or even none at all the next season.
When your pet is young, do train them to be rewarded for calm, non anxious behavior during a storm. Have a tornado drill on non storm days running into the bathroom, calling your pet in quickly and give them a yummy treat. Teach them to go down the basement stairs on command and reward them. Give them a bed, crate or in the bath tub to lie on and reward them for going there fast and lying calmly. Heavy beat rock music or Egyptian/Indian music is very helpful also.

# IEMA Offers Safety Tips during National Flood Safety Awareness Week

On flooded roads, "Turn Around, Don't Drown" can save lives
SPRINGFIELD - With the spring 2013 floods still fresh in the minds of many Illinois residents, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) today joined the National Weather Service (NWS) and other emergency management organizations across the country to observe National Flood Safety Awareness Week March 16-22. Throughout the week, IEMA will encourage Illinois residents to learn more about flooding and to take steps to be better prepared.
"We're keeping a close eye on rivers and streams across the state so that we're prepared for potential flooding this spring," said IEMA Director Jonathon Monken. "But it's also important for people to stay aware of flood risks in their communities and know what they can do to stay safe if flooding occurs."

Monken said one of the most important safety tips during flooding is, "Turn Around, Don't Drown," which is intended to remind people to never drive on a flooded road. Most flood-related fatalities involve people in vehicles attempting to drive through water covering a road. The
speed and depth of the water is not always obvious, and as little as two feet of rushing water can sweep away most vehicles, including trucks and SUVs.
Flood preparedness tips include:

- Develop a family emergency plan and review it with all family members.
- Maintain an emergency supply kit with bottled water, nonperishable food, first-aid items, flashlight, radio, batteries and more.
- Stay aware of weather conditions in your area, particularly if you live or work in areas known to flood.
- Make an itemized list of your personal property. Include photos and/or videos of the inside and outside of your home. Store these documents in a safe location away from your home.
- Consider purchasing flood insurance, since flood losses are not covered under homeowners' insurance policies.

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meet with strong finishes capturing $2^{\text {nd }}$ place in the pole vault with a mark of 11 feet, 6 inches while finishing $8^{\text {th }}$ in the 60 meter high hurdles with a time of 10.32 seconds and grabbing a $7^{\text {th }}$ place finish in the 800 meter run with a time of 2 minutes, 19.81 seconds. Nash was the lone representative in the shot put and finished with a throw of 35 feet, $103 / 4$ inches while Maxedon competed in the 1600 meter run and came in with a time of 5 minutes, 40.19 seconds, both results ending up outside of the top ten in each event.

The boys' then headed to Lantz Fieldhouse on the campus of Eastern Illinois University last Saturday for the EIU Indoor Invitational hosted by the Charleston Trojans. Just like the meet in Mahomet, Preston Skinner continued his strong start capturing $3^{\text {rd }}$ place in the 200 meter dash posting a time of 23.77 seconds, which was only .4 of a second off of the winning time. That finish vaulted the STC team to a team total of 11 points on the day, which was good for a $25^{\text {th }}$ place finish.
That same day was the start of the girls' season as Andi Luth competed in the Bulldogs Indoor Invitational in Mahomet. Luth is one of seven young women from Shiloh and Oakland that will take to the track for the Raiders this season and looked to get off to a strong start. Luth participated in three events and started the 2014 season solid finishing in the top fifteen in each of the events with her best finish being in $6^{\text {th }}$ place in the 400 meter run. She also finished in $10^{\text {th }}$ place in the 60 meter dash and $11^{\text {th }}$ place in the 200 meter run. STC as a team finished with 3 team points which was good for $14^{\text {th }}$ place overall.
