100th Anniversary of Mother's Dayby Charlotte Wax

May 11, 2014 will be the 100th Anniversary of Mother's Day. On May 20, 1914 President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill recognizing Mother's Day as a national holiday to be celebrated the 2nd Sunday in May. It recognizes mother, motherhood, and maternal bonds as well as possible contributions that they make to society. The dictionary defines Mother as the origin of anything, the original, to adopt as one's own, and the source of life. President Franklin D. Roosevelt approved a stamp commemorating the holiday in 1934.

The first attempt to establish Mother's Day came from Women's Peace groups with meetings of mothers whose sons had fought or died on opposite side of the Civil War. Anna

Jarvis campaigned to establish Mother's Day following the death of her mother. Carnations have come to represent Mother's Day since Anna Jarvis delivered 500 of them at the first celebration in 1908. She chose the carnation because it was the favorite flower of her mother. Florists invented the idea of wearing a red carnation if your mother was living or a white one if she was dead.

On this day we honor all mothers, and in particular our gold Star and Blue Star Mothers. American gold Star Mothers, Inc. is an organization of mothers whose sons or daughters served and died while serving their nation in times of war or conflict. 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

LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Editor:

Newman, IL – Saturday, May 10th marks the 22nd anniversary of one of America's great days of giving – the National Association of Letter Carriers Stamp Out Hunger Food drive.

Letter carriers make their rounds through the community every day, often coming face to face with a sad reality for too many, hunger. So, each year on the second Saturday in May, letter carriers across the country collect nonperishable food donations from our customers. Your donations will go directly to the Murdock food pantry to help people in our area.

Last year, we collected over 74 million pounds of food nationally, feeding an estimated 30 million people. Over the course of its 21-year history, the drive has collected well over one billion pounds of food thanks to a postal service universal delivery network that spans the entire nation, including Puerto Rico, Guam and U.S. Virgin Islands.

The need for food donations is great. Currently, 49 million Americans – 1 in 6 - are unsure where their next meal is coming from. Sixteen million are children who feel hunger's impact on their overall health and ability to perform in school. And nearly 5 million seniors over age 60 are food insecure, with many who live on fixed incomes often too embarrassed to ask for help. Our food drive's timing is crucial. Food banks and pantries often receive the majority of their donations during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday seasons. By springtime, many pantries are depleted, entering the summer low on supplies at a time when many school breakfast and lunch programs are not available to children in need. Participating in this year's Letter Carrier Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive is simple. Just leave a non-perishable food donation in a bag by your mailbox on Saturday, May 10th and your letter carrier will do the rest. 

Motorcycle Awareness and Safety

Perhaps you enjoy riding a motorcycle, but maybe you are afraid of them or fear the reputation that some bikers have. Possibly you know of someone who was injured or killed in a motorcycle accident. However, motorcycles are a popular way to get around and all drivers need to share the roads with many different kinds of vehicles. In recognition of safety issues involved, May has been designated Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month and the National Safety Council will be encouraging motorists to share the road with motorcyclists and to be extra alert when the bikers are nearby.

Motorcyclist fatalities totaled approximately 4,500 in 2011 – nearly the same number reported in 2010 according to a report by the Governors Highway Safety Association.

Researchers compared preliminary roadway fatality data from each state and the District of Columbia for the first nine months of 2010 and 2011 and found that motorcyclist fatalities decreased in 23 states, with notable declines in three states - 37 percent in Connecticut, 16 percent in New York and 21 percent in North Carolina. However, 26 states reported an increase in fatalities. The decreases were thought to be because of several things that included enforcement, education and engineering.

Motorcycle fatalities remain one of the few areas in highway safety where progress is not being made, according to GHSA. Researchers recommend that states should focus on alcohol use, speeding and helmet use among motorcyclists, and offer more training

Spring and summer bring warm weather and motorcycle traffic increases accordingly. Motorcycles are harder to see in a vehicle's blind spot so motorists need to be especially careful in checking those blind spots and mirrors when changing traffic lanes.

Other safety measures that drivers can

- Do not follow a motorcycle too closely
- Be very cautious at intersections. Most accidents happen when a driver doesn't see a motorcycle and turns left in
- Never try to share a lane with a bike. Motorcycles should have a full lane.

Motorcyclists also share safety responsibilities. The National Safety Council recommends these tips:

- Get properly trained and licensed
- Don't ride in poor weather conditions Position your bike in the lane so that
- you won't be in a driver's blind spot • Use your turn signals for every lane
- Wear protective gear each time you
- Don't ride if impaired by alcohol or
- Ride within your own skill limits
- Take refresher courses when offered. Be a lifelong learner.

So, no matter if you are driving a car or riding a motorcycle, please be aware of each other, apply safety measures, and don't drink and drive. Live to enjoy

SPRINGFIELD - While every household should have a disaster supply kit stocked with food, water, flashlights and batteries, homes with pets need to take additional steps when planning for disasters. Whether an emergency forces people to seek shelter within the home or evacuate, advanced planning can ensure the safety

Throughout May, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) and local emergency management agencies throughout the state will be working to increase awareness of pet preparedness.

"The recent deadly tornadoes across the South are a grim reminder that disasters can happen with little warning," said IEMA Director Jonathon Monken. "The better you've prepared in advance for the needs of everyone in your family, including your pets, the better chance you all have of weathering any disaster."


Monken said pet owners should stock a pet preparedness kit with items such

- At least a three-day supply of food
- Extra supplies of pet medicines
- Copies of pet registration, vaccinations and other important

- Photo of your pet in case you are separated during an emergency
- Pet first-aid kit, including cotton bandage rolls, tape, antibiotic ointment, flea and tick prevention and isopropyl
 - Collar with ID tag, harness or leash
- Crate or other pet carrier in case of evacuation
- Pet litter and box, newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach for pet's sanitation needs
- Toys, treats or other familiar items to help lessen your pet's stress during the emergency

As part of pet preparedness month, IEMA and the Illinois Broadcasters Association (IBA) are reintroducing a series of radio spots based on the classic "Animal Stories" vignettes from WLS radio in the 1970s. The humorous spots feature the late Larry Lujack and Tommy Edwards reprising their roles as "Uncle Lar' and Li'l Tommy" to highlight the importance of pet emergency preparedness. The seven spots were first released in 2012 and played on more than 200 IBA member stations throughout Illinois. The "Animal Stories" pet preparedness spots and additional emergency preparedness information are available on the Ready Illinois website at www.Ready.Illinois.gov.




